PROGRAM NOTES

In June of this year, I had the honor and privilege of having one of my plays included in the Lanford Wilson New American Play Festival, where I spent a wonderful week. This reminded and reinforced for me the importance of what has long been one of my chief goals for "The Essential Theatre Playwriting Competition" – that it provides the kind of opportunities and positive experience for playwrights that I would like to find for my own work.

Since the annual Essential Festival began in 1999, every year we have produced at least one new play by a Georgia playwright, and since 2012 that has been our sole focus. The Essential Theatre Playwriting Award remains the only competition of its kind, exclusively dedicated to the work of Georgia writers. Some of the plays we've premiered have gone on to further productions (Jordan Pulliam's *Bat-Hamlet* has had well over a dozen productions since its Essential debut) but, more importantly, many of the writers whose early work we showcased have continued to have their work produced around the country. At Essential, we like to think that we don't just develop plays, we develop playwrights. Lauren Gunderson, the most produced living American playwright of the past few years, and the first winner of our Playwriting Award, is only the most obvious example. Gabriel Jason Dean,



who won the Essential prize in 2010, has continued to win awards and have his work produced, with one of them appearing Off-Broadway this past season. Recent winners Emily McClain and Erin Considine are finding a lot of success with their work, as well.

In 2020 we chose two co-winners for the Essential Award, but we were not able to produce them because of the COVID pandemic. This year we're going back to pick up one of them – Daniel Carter Brown's *The Outrage Machine*, a satirical look at some of the misuses of digital and social media. In the past two years, those problems have become more apparent to everyone, with many people backing off from Facebook and other platforms. But what gives Dan's play its staying power, I think, is that it goes deeper than commentary about the pitfalls of a particular technology – it's about the all-too-human susceptibility to making snap judgments about other people, based on a very small amount of (sometimes inaccurate) information. We see or hear or read one or two things about someone we've never met, and we condemn and dismiss them without a second thought.

This year's winner of the Essential Theatre Playwriting Award is John Mabey's *A Complicated Hope*, which has also won two other national playwriting honors – the Charles M. Getchell New Play Contest and the Albert and Mildred Panowski Playwriting Award. John's play is about the sometimes surprising ways we find to connect and heal ourselves when we have lost a loved one. It is a play that seems to exist in its own state of timelessness – the place of grieving, where past and present blur into one another. (Be advised, the play does not always proceed in a strictly chronological manner.)

Rounding out the Festival will be three readings in our Bare Essentials Play Reading Series and, for one night only on August 18, we'll be hosting a reading by our friends at Hush Harbor Lab. Founded by one of our Education Associates Amina McIntyre, and Addae Moon, Hush Harbor Lab is Atlanta's Black Play Development Company. The organization is just over two years old, but McIntyre and Moon are well-established playwrights in the local and national theater scene, and Essential is excited to provide a new stage for their vision and talent. They will be presenting a reading of Kelundra Smith's *The Wash*, an intimate and often funny tale of women who went from workers to fighters, and won, based on true events.




ABOUT HUSH HARBOR LAB

Courses for Writers

Introduction to Playwriting Community Courses – offered in partnership with community organizations throughout the state including virtually through our partnership with the West End Performing Arts Center, Essential Theatre's Introduction to Playwriting course is a six-week introduction to the art and form of playwriting in which participants learn about the elements of playwriting by studying examples, hearing from professional Georgia playwrights, and sharing writing exercises of their own.

Resources for Teachers

Introduction to Playwriting for the Classroom aligns with the Georgia Standards of Excellence for Dramatic Arts/Theatre for grades 9-12. Students will learn about the elements of playwriting by studying examples, hearing from professional Georgia playwrights, and sharing writing exercises of their own. Students receive feedback from instructors and peers in a supportive environment that fosters confidence and growth.
